# Principles and Values

At Park Lane Primary School, we are aware that pupils may be bullied in any school or setting, and recognise that preventing, raising awareness and consistently responding to any cases of bullying should be a priority to ensure the safety and well-being of our pupils.

In line with the Equality Act 2010, it is essential that our school:

- Eliminates unlawful discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct prohibited by the Act;
- Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it; and
- Foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it.

As a school we take bullying and its impact seriously. Pupils and parents should be assured that known incidents of bullying will be responded to immediately.

Bullying will not be tolerated. The school will seek ways to counter the effects of bullying that may occur within school or in the local community. The ethos of our school fosters high expectations of outstanding behaviour and we will consistently challenge any behaviour that falls below this.

## Aims

We are determined to promote and develop a culture where bullying behaviour is regarded as unacceptable, to ensure a safe and secure environment is sustained for all pupils. We aim for all pupils to reach their potential academically, socially and personally through learning and playing in a safe and secure environment.

- To outline what Park Lane Primary will prevent and tackle all forms of bullying
- To set a culture within the school community where bullying is not tolerated
- Park Lane Primary School is committed to developing an anti-bullying culture where the bullying of adults, children or young people is not tolerated in any form.

# Objectives

For the Park Lane community to have an understanding of what bullying is and how to deal with it

# What is Bullying?

At Park Lane Primary School, we discuss what bullying is, as well as incidents we would not describe as bullying, with all pupils through assemblies and PSHE lessons.

There is no legal definition of bullying. However, it's usually defined as behaviour that is:

- repeated
- intended to hurt someone either physically or emotionally
- often aimed at certain groups, for example because of race, religion, gender or sexual orientation
- Bullying usually happens when the relationship is imbalanced



It takes many forms and can include:

- physical assault
- teasing
- making threats
- name calling
- cyberbullying bullying via mobile phone or online (for example email, social networks and instant messenger)

Bullying can take place in the classroom, playground, toilets, on the journey to and from school, on residential trips and cyberspace. It can take place in group activities and between families in the local community. Bullying that happens outside of school but has an impact within the school environment will be addressed and dealt in the most appropriate manner.

# Types of Bullying

## **Cyber-Bullying**

The rapid development of, and widespread access to, technology has provided a new medium for 'virtual bullying', which can occur in and outside school. Cyber-bullying is a different form of bullying which can happen beyond the school day into home and private space, with a potentially bigger audience, and more accessories as people forward on content.

## **Racist Bullying**

This refers to a range of hurtful behaviour, both physical and psychological, that make the person feel unwelcome marginalised and excluded, powerless or worthless because of their colour, ethnicity culture, faith community, national origin or national status.

## **Homophobic Bullying**

This occurs when bullying is motivated by a prejudice against lesbian, gay, bisexual or transsexual people.

# Vulnerable Groups

We recognise that some groups of pupils may be more vulnerable to bullying, including:

- Looked After Children
- Gypsy, Roma and Traveller children
- Children with Special Educational Needs or Disabilities (SEND)
- Children from ethnic minorities
- Children entitled to Free School Meals
- Children for whom English is an Additional Language
- Children who are perceived to be gay, lesbian, bisexual or transsexual

# Perpetrators and Victims

Bullying takes place where there is an imbalance of power of one person or persons over another. This can be due to:

- their position within school, their physical characteristics
- or exerting control through social media channels



Staff must remain vigilant about bullying behaviours and take appropriate action as soon as they become aware of the concern. Staff must also be aware of the additional vulnerability of some pupils which may lead them to either be a target for bullying or be more likely to bully others. As a school we understand that both the victim and the bully have needs that should be addressed.

Staff should be vigilant in looking out for signs of bullying or other child protection issues including:

**Physical**: unexplained bruises, scratches, cuts, missing belongings, damaged clothes, or schoolwork, loss of appetite, stomach aches, headaches, bedwetting.

**Emotional**: losing interest in school, being withdrawn or secretive, unusual shows of temper, refusal to say why unhappy, high level of anxiety, mood swings, tearfulness for no reason, lack of confidence, headaches and stomach aches, signs of depression.

**Behavioural**: asking to be taken to school, coming home for lunch, taking longer to get home, asking for more money, using different routes to school, 'losing' more items than usual, sudden changes in behaviour and mood, concentration difficulties, truancy.

#### Prevention

At Park Lane Primary, we have a 'telling school' culture where staff, children and visitors take ownership of and responsibility for the well-being of all children, by being vigilant regarding bullying and reporting concerns, where they have them. This is done through discussion and education about bullying within PSHE, schools' values and using real life examples as learning points. All children and staff have access to the Nurture Team where they can share their worries or concerns.


We will provide support to pupils who are bullied in the following way:

- They will be reassured that they do not deserve to be bullied and this is not their fault
- We will assure them that it was right to report the incident
- We will encourage them to talk about how they feel
- We will try to ascertain the extent of the problem
- We will engage them in making choices about how the matter may be resolved
- We will try to ensure that they feel safe
- We will discuss strategies for being safe and staying safe
- We will ask them to report immediately any further incidents to us
- We will affirm that bullying can be stopped and that our school will persist with intervention until it does
- We will involve their friends / older pupils in peer support / the buddy system/ mediation



# Dealing with bullying

Please see the flow chart below for the steps we will follow when dealing with bullying:



N.B- Parents will be informed and involved, where appropriate, throughout the process.

# Recording of Bullying Incidents

When an incident of bullying has taken place, staff must record the incident on CPOMS. In the case of racist bullying, this must be reported to the Head of School as well as CPOMS.

General incidences of bullying should be recorded in the Behaviour Log; this would include incidents where staff have had to become involved and speak with children, and/or where parents have raised concerns regarding bullying. Confirmed cases of bullying must be recorded following the ROC procedure, as with any case of Child Protection.

All incidents of bullying will be discussed with all relevant staff and parents of the children involved, in order that everyone can be vigilant and that further incidents by the same child(ren) may be prevented from happening in the future.

Incidents of bullying will be discussed with the Governing Body (Safeguarding Governors)



As a school we do not encourage parents to:

- Attempt to sort the problem out yourself by speaking to the child whom you think may be behaving inappropriately towards your child or by speaking to their parents.
- Encourage your child to be 'a bully' back.
- Both of these will only make the problem much harder to solve
