# Pre-School Griffins

Pre-School have had an exciting start to 2022, learning all about our topic: 'Where Does Snow Go?' This exciting topic has seen us create beautiful art work that is now proudly hanging from the ceiling to showcase to our visitors. We created furry polar bears by using forks to paint and mimic the texture of the hairs of the polar bear: the tiny strokes of the fork worked well to capture the polar bear image. We have spent time discussing emotions and how to recognise facial expressions to know how others are feeling. Using this knowledge, we drew different emotions onto snowmen (they look fantastic) if we do say so ourselves!

Unfortunately, it has not snowed during our topic, but we have had the opportunity to explore ice and frost, developing scientific vocabulary and concepts.

What a fabulous start to the new year Pre-School Griffins.

## Reception

This half term Reception have been exploring the continent of Africa through many different forms. We have explored Kenyan villages in our PSED lessons to discover the similarities and differences between ourselves, and others. We also compared different countries throughout Africa to gain a wider perspective of what it means to be African in many different ways.

Through our Art lessons, we have created traditional African tribal masks out of cardboard, paints, and twine. We also created African style villages of our own in the classroom made from lollypop sticks, wool and feathers. We modelled these on the homes we have explored throughout our Geography lessons. Also, in Geography, Reception have successfully managed to follow directions on a map to see the key areas of their school, which lead them to secret treasure... Exciting!

Reception have been very excited this month to be learning of the celebrations of Kwanzaa, a festival celebrated by African-Americans, and have participated in some of the festivities; understanding how other cultures celebrate special events throughout our RE sessions. Together we made kinara candles out of playdough. We even made plantain in the kitchen ourselves which we really enjoyed at snack time.

A busy start of the year for our Reception Griffins!



This term in Year 1, we have started our new topic, "Moon Zoom." In this topic the children have been learning all about space and have been looking at the inspirational figure Neil Armstrong and finding out about his life and all the amazing things that he has achieved. The children have also been looking at the stories: Beegu and Aliens love Underpants. We have been learning to make predictions in our writing and how to use adjectives and nouns to improve it. We have also been learning all about materials and their properties, and have been making predictions about objects and conducting experiments to find out if our predictions were correct. Also, we have had lots of fun designing and making our own rockets and planets in art.

A busy start to your new topic Year 1: it's been lovely to observe how inspired you have been through your learning about astronauts.

## Year 2

This half-term, our topic is Towers, Tunnels and Turrets. We have thoroughly enjoyed the topic and have been engaged in all of the activities that we have taken part in. As a way to excite the children initially, we took them to the outdoor learning space, where they used the giant construction materials to construct their own Towers, Tunnels and Turrets. We had to work well in a team to create their structures and showed resilience and determination throughout. We think that they would make pretty good structural engineers!!

In English, as one of the priorities for our Griffins is to develop pleasure in reading, we have spent time focusing on just that! To link to our topic, we have read a version of Rapunzel, who is famous for being locked away in a tall tower. The children enjoyed planning their own version of the story, where they replaced the witch for dragons, aliens and ogres! They will have a go at writing a section of their plan before the end of the half-term and we can't wait to see how they elaborate on these.

This is a small snippet of all of the exciting things that the children have been up to during this topic. It is certainly one that has been enjoyed and embraced by all.





## Year 3

In Year 3, we have we have been learning lots of really interesting facts about Stone Age life. *Did you know that people actually ate caterpillars?*Ugh! They also spread manure over the walls of their buildings to keep the wind and rain out. How smelly would that have been? We have also been learning and discovering many more facts about Stonehenge and The Bronze Age!

In Science, we have began to learn about forces and how they act upon objects. We have investigated the effects of friction on different surfaces and had a great time predicting the surface which would create the most friction, measuring the results and explaining the force of friction by using many different surfaces, a toy car and a ruler.

It's been a promising start to the year and we are excited for what is to come.





## Year 4

In Year 4, we have been continuing our journey through time, as we have moved onto studying the Saxons and Vikings. Our *Traders and Raiders* topic looks at how life in Britain changed with the arrival of settlers from different countries. We are learning about some of the myths and legends of the Saxon and Viking people and taking inspiration for our art work from Anglo-Saxon carving and tapestries.

We have also welcomed some special visitors to Park Lane, a couple of Vikings, who immersed us in Viking culture for the day.

In teams, we have created our very own timeline of the key events that took place. We used our knowledge of the dates, important figures and events to accurately place the events on the timeline. We then decorated them with battle scenes between the British and Saxon fighters.

Sounds as if you have had a great start to your new Topic and have learnt lots of interesting facts.

This term in topic, Year 5 have been focusing on the topic of *Maafa*, which is all about Africa's past and present and teaches the children about the development of the slave trade. It also explores Britain's role in the transatlantic slave trade, the causes and consequences of the European colonisation of Africa and the worldwide communities that make up the African diaspora. We began this topic by focusing on the Geography of both ancient and modern Africa and exploring how the continent and its' countries halve changed over the last few centuries. Then, we looked deeper in the history of the Kingdom of Benin, where we learnt all about the rulers and cultures of the Kingdom before it was annexed by the British empire in 1897.

In Art, we have also been exploring influential African-American artist Kara Walker, focusing on her unique style of using black paper silhouettes against white backgrounds. We learnt about how her striking artwork is inspired by the historical consequences of slavery throughout the world. Year 5 are going to be creating some of their own artwork in the style of Kara Walker, which will be displayed outside of our classrooms. We have also been learning all about the Windrush generation, given that this is such an important conversation for everyone to be engaging with.

Fabulous Year 5 - you should be very proud of the work you have produced!



## Year 6

In Year 6, we have started our new topic: *Maafa*. This topic encompasses a wide range of areas related to the Maafa. Maafa is a Swahili term which means 'great disaster' and is often used to refer to the atrocities suffered by Africans under colonialism. To begin with, we looked at the Kingdom of Benin a great civilisation located in modern-day Nigeria. We explored its location, alongside other African countries by using various maps (digital and atlases). We also learnt about some of the major events through creating a timeline of the kingdoms history. This has helped us to understand what life was like for some people in Africa before colonialism.

Towards the end of the half term, we have been learning about the trans-Atlantic slave trade and its devastating impact on the people involved. We also studied migration and the push and pull factors involved through the case study of the Windrush migration of people migrating from the Caribbean to the UK.

Sounds very interesting Year 6 - lots of interesting facts to add to your schemas.



## The Nurture Team

This half term, staff members from the Nurture team have been running a series of Interventions which support the children's additional needs. Miss Edwards has been focusing on exploring sensory play and how to recognise emotions and feelings.

The children have responded well and are using the skills learnt in their everyday school life. Next month Miss Edwards is focusing on perseverance and persistence - look out for this in next month's newsletter issue.

Ruby, Ralph and Mylo have been very busy during their training sessions with Brett: they have been learning how to interact with one another and how to follow simple commands. The Nurture Team have also been learning how to understand the dog's behaviours so that when the children are working closely with then, they are able to communicate effectively. Each of the dog's personalities are so very different and all are very loved by the Park Lane Family very much.

Following feedback on our family survey, we have recently reviewed our programme to ensure we are offering further opportunities for younger Griffins and different genders.



## Year 5 Residential

On Wednesday 2nd February some of our year 5 Griffins set off on their Residential to Whitemoore Lakes, a proud tradition for our year 5 Griffins. For most of our Griffins it was their first time away from their parents.

When we arrived at Whitemoor lakes the children had a tour of the site and then they headed straight to their rooms where they had to make their beds and unpack ready for a busy fun packed three days!

Over the three days, all the children had the opportunity to take part in many different activities which included Abseiling, Rock Climbing, Nightline, High Ropes, Archery, Circus skills and Canoeing. During these activities, the Griffins faced many challenges and over came fears. They demonstrated the school values throughout such as resilience, perseverance, trust, courage, responsibility and determination. An example of this was the rock climbing where they had to work as a team and trust in each other to keep the rope tight and secure for the person climbing the wall.

Other highlights of our trip included wrapping up and heading outside for a campfire All the griffins enjoyed singing camp songs around the campfire and took part in a banana eating race where you could only use one hand and your mouth. Which is trickier than it sounds! Another highlight of the trip was the disco! This gave the children time to be with their friends and show off their best dance moves! Throughout the trip the Griffins used every break they had to play pool, table tennis, foosball and card games. All the Griffins enjoyed competing against each other and also working as a team.

We are so proud of our Year 5 Griffins: they represented the school like true Griffins and were constantly complimented on their good manners and friendly behaviour.







## RE at Park Lane

At Park Lane our Religious and Worldviews Education curriculum gives our Griffins opportunities to learn about the diversity of beliefs of different people, as well as the space to ask questions and reflect on their own views and beliefs. During the year, each year group looks at three different strands of learning: Believing, Expressing and Living. Children learn the key stories and beliefs from the range of faith groups studied, as well as finding

out how they express their faith in their daily lives and how they impact their community. As Covid restrictions are gradually being lifted, our Griffins will be having the privilege of visiting places of worship.

In the Early Years phase, RE is incorporated into Understanding the World. Our Nursery Griffins have been having fun learning about Chinese New Year. They learned the story behind the festival and made Chinese lanterns.

#### **EYFS/Key Stage 1**

In Reception, the children learned about Kwanzaa, a celebration of African-American culture. They learned about the symbols of the celebration and thought about what they wanted to do when they grow up. In Year 1 our Griffins have been learning about special people and acting out some stories from the Bible about Jesus.


#### **Key Stage 2**

Our Year 2 Griffins have been learning about the teachings of Jesus from the Bible. In Year 3 the children have been learning about different festivals. They have looked at the Hindu celebration of Diwali and how Muslims celebrate Ramadan and Eid. Year 4 have been learning about why some people think that life is like a journey. We thought about the significant events in our own lives and looked at Christian baptism, Bat and Bar Mitzvah ceremonies in Judaism and the Hindu sacred thread ceremony.

In Year 5 our Griffins have been learning about sacred places. We thought about why some places are special and reflected on places that are significant to us. Year 6 have been learning about what is important to Christians and Humanists. We discussed the

values that some Humanists think are important.

It's been a busy half-term and our Griffins should be proud of their hard work!





### Science at Park Lane

#### **Early Years**

Our reception children had the opportunity to explore what materials could be used to prevent an egg from breaking. The children experimented how we could stop an egg from breaking when dropped from shoulder hight. IN order to do this, the children placed an egg into a sandwich bag and filled it with different materials, such as card, foam, shaving cream, paper in order to stop the impact of the egg hitting the floor and causing it to break. The children had lots of fun experimenting with different materials and trying not to make to much of an 'eggy mess'!

#### KS<sub>1</sub>

Our KS1 children have been looking at materials and their various properties this half term. The Year 1 children took part in a blind bag experiment, where they had to identify the object in the bag by only using their sense of touch. When identifying the object, they would explain what properties they could identify, such as 'this is cold' or 'this is hard'. The Year 2s have been sorting and organising different materials based on their properties. They took part in an outdoor investigation where they hunted for different materials, such as metal and wood and organised them based on their uses. Some wonderful work from our KS1 Griffins.

#### LKS<sub>2</sub>

Our LKS2 children have been looking at both forces and electricity this term. The Year 3s have been testing the strengths of magnets, by taking it in turns to add a paper clip to different magnets to see how many they could attract after making a collection of predictions. From this they drew their own bar charts in order to explain their findings. Our Year 4 children have been exploring electricity and had a go at creating their own circuits. They explored the different parts of an electrical circuit and discovered the difference between a complete and incomplete circuit. The children also made predictions based on what materials would be the best at conducting electricity. Well done to all of our Year 3 and 4 Griffins for their hard work this term in Science.

#### **UKS2**

This term, our Year 5 and 6s have been exploring all about light sources and shadows. Over the course of a week of learning, the children learned how shadows are created and why shadows change size and shape throughout the day. This learning culminated in an experiment that the children led, in which they used a torch to represent the sun and used equipment that represented different times of day. This enabled them to create a shadow which they then measured. The children worked brilliantly well in teams and had a lot of fun in the process. Well done to our Year 5 and 6 Griffins for their brilliant efforts this term.



#### **Attendance**

December's winning class was Mr Eccles' Reception class, as announced in the last newsletter. Their prize is a trip for the whole class to Hoar Park Children's Farm to meet the animals and have the opportunity to feed them too. We hope RJE have a lovely time and enjoy their reward.



#### **Lateness**

Previous newsletters have highlighted the importance of high levels of attendance for children for their educational attainment; lateness also has an impact on children's ability to learn for a number of reasons: the beginning of the school day is used to ease the transition from the morning rush and journey to learning and paying attention, often with quiet reading.

Children are often embarrassed to arrive late into class in front of other children, which you can imagine does not make them feel ready to learn or help their self esteem. Punctuality is an important life skill to develop for adulthood and employment. It becomes a habit and second nature if started at an early stage. If a child is just 5 minutes late every day, that adds up to 3 days over a year of lost learning. If a child is 15 minutes late every day, that adds up to 10 days over the year. It may not seem to matter if a child is a few minutes late, but it has a huge impact on them and the experience of the other children in their class: please ensure that you arrive at school from 8:45 - 9:00am.



Stephen King







We're Going on a Bear Hunt Micheal Rosen





