We applied our creative skills and explored colours when celebrating Chinese New Year and had lots of fun with all things number for NSPCC Number Day. We have created some wonderful pieces of Art and have investigated different textures and smells using play dough and moon dough. We also had a go at making some Bear Toast and applied our spreading skills to butter the toast, to then enjoy it during snack time.

The most exciting part of this half term has been making new friends: we have loved getting to know everyone and welcoming them to our growing Family.

Pre-School Griffins

Our Pre School Griffins have been very busy this half-term learning lots about different animals and their habitats, focusing on jungle and rainforest animals, through our topic of 'Why Do Zebras Have Stripes?' A key text we have explored throughout our learning is 'Monkey Puzzle:' a tale about a young monkey that has sadly lost her Mum. We have been developing our fine motor and early writing skills by creating 'LOST' posters. Throughout this activity, the children were able to apply their skills in sequencing and retelling the story, talking about what animals the young monkey met along the way that helped find her way back to her mum. The children have created their own wonderful butterflies from the story, exploring colours and different materials.

Well done Pre-School Griffins: you have shown lots of maturity and resilience this half-term - well done!

Reception

Our Receptions focus this half term has been, 'Why do Zebras have stripes?' which focused on jungle and zoo animals. The children have explored three key texts this half term: 'Handa's Surprise', 'The Lion Who Wanted to Love' and 'Giraffes Can't Dance.' They have thoroughly enjoyed this topic and have explored different animals and created some prints to go onto our display board. They have been creating lots of sentences and have had a heavy focus on blending this half term too, with the help of our friend, the infamous Fred the Frog. They also experienced a fruit taste testing session to relate to the fruits in the story of Handa's Surprise. We have created some wonderfully creative pieces of art in the form of self-portraits and roses for Valentines Day.

The children have also learnt two new songs this half term for our assembly, which we hope our families enjoyed: *L.O.V.E* by Nat King Cole and *All About You* by McFly. The children spent many weeks rehearsing the songs during their learning choices and at the end of each day before they would go home. We have also introduced our class teddies, which go home with a different child each weekend for a new adventure. This has been a huge success so far and we are excited to continue this next half term too!









Year 1

In Year 1 we have been exploring the texts 'On the Moon' and 'Beegu,' both of which books link to our topic Space. We began by looking at the book, Beegu: the children loved predicting what was going to happen to Beegu after he landed on Earth using our 'predicting pip' skills. We had lots of discussions around what Beegu looks like, and the children came up with some fantastic adjectives to describe her. Following on from this, the children drew their very own alien and described what they looked like using lots of adjectives!

We also looked at the story 'On the Moon,' this gave us lots of opportunities to learn about what it is like on the Moon and the children discovered who the first man to walk on the moon was: Mr Neil Armstrong! The children learnt lots of facts about him and the Apollo 11 mission and we wrote some fantastic reports. To expand on our knowledge further, we took a trip to the National Space Centre where the children got to see Neil Armstrong's actual space suit and a real-life rocket. When we got to school we wrote a recount all about what we had learnt.

You have displayed your Griffin Learning Behaviours wonderfully Year 1 - well done!



Year 2

Our Year 2 Family have been further exploring their topic of *Towers, Tunnels and Turrets*. We have enjoyed reading the story of *Rapunzel* and using this as the focus for some of our English work. To begin, we focused on the traditional version of *Rapunzel*. We thought about the witch and her character, applied adjectives to write noun phrases to describe her. We then retold the story, remembering the sequence and writing it down in sections. We then read an alternative version of *Rapunzel*, where there is no prince and Rapunzel rescues herself - it was very interesting!

We then moved onto writing a newspaper report about *Rapunzel* marrying her Prince. We included the paper's name, the headline, a picture and a caption. We also tried to include speech in our writing using speech marks. Year 2 have loved reading the story of *Rapunzel* and have made some fabulous progress with their writing.

Well done and keep up the fantastic work Year 2!














Year 3

This half term in Year 3 we have been reading *Stig of the Dump*: it is an exciting story about a boy called Barney, who befriends a boy from the Stone Age called Stig.

We have performed some drama, based on one of the scenes where Barney is trying to explain how Stig behaves to his family. We have also written a character study to describe Stig's personality and written our own Stone Age adventure story.

Part of our English learning has also been about writing factfiles, and we have produced our own about the fascinating Stonehenge. We applied our Computing skills to this part of our learning as we had to collate all of the information about Stonehenge, including our newly sought information from the World Wide Web. We then had to choose how to best present our information!

Sounds like you have been working very hard Year 3 - keep it up!



Year 4

In Year 4 during our English learning, we have been exploring 'The Saga of Erik the Viking' by Terry Jones. This tale links closely to our topic Raiders and Traders which explores the lives of Vikings and Anglo Saxons in Britain. We have read many chapters and are developing our reading skills: we frequently use commentary to discuss our opinions and thoughts on the chapter. We pick out unfamiliar vocabulary and use our dictionary skills to find the definition, we summarise and predict the future events. This has helped up grasp a deeper understanding of the character and the story.

We have used the book as a basis for many of our writing pieces this half-term: we have researched the Vikings and created fact files, written a recount of a Viking invasion from the perspective of the Monks and have written exciting and emotional poetry about a scared Viking in a rough storm. In doing so, we have embedded our knowledge of adjectives, expanded noun phrases, determiners, and prepositions.

Well done to Year 4 for their fabulous writing this term!

Year 5

In Year 5, our class text in English has been *Holes* by Louis Sachar. It revolves around the protagonist – Stanley Yelnats – and his stay at *Camp Green Lake*. However, he soon finds that it is not a camp, there is not a lake and there is no green to be seen. It is, in fact, a correctional facility for juveniles and the penalty that the boys who are interred there have to pay, is to dig a large hole every day. In the book, we learn in a flashback all about the story of Kissin' Kate Barlow (a schoolteacher/outlaw).

Our English work has been very much centred around this sub plot. We have created freeze frames of the events as well as creating and acting out scenes from the drama. From this, Year 5 have been able to create a newspaper report retelling events leading up to how a humble schoolteacher became a feared outlaw. The children used a variety of devices in their writing such as reported and direct speech, colons and semicolons and active and passive voice. Finally, they have been using the text to improve their reading skills. A recommended read for many other young children!

Year 5, you are progressing fantastically - well done!



Year 6

In Year 6 this half-term, the class text we have explored in English is *Holes* by author Louis Sachar. During this time, we have been discussing themes such as inequality, friendship and racism and examining how these are addressed in the book. Following this, we have discussed this text further in our lessons by exploring comprehension and inference style questions in preparation for our SATs. After reading the text and identifying themes, the children created a newspaper report based on the character 'Katherine Barlow' (Kissin' Kate). Children enjoyed reporting about the former teacher turned outlaw using direct and reported speech and using shifts in formality to create fantastic pieces of work.

We have also had a particular focus on grammar this half-term as the children are beginning to prepare for their upcoming SATs. We have been exploring more grammatical devices, such as active and passive voice, and the children have been implementing this in their work wonderfully showing that they can apply their learning to their own work.

Perseverance has been key and Year 6 are doing a fantastic job at showcasing this to the rest of their peers - well done!



The Nurture Team



In our Nurture provision this half term, we have been exploring ways to relax including experiencing children's yoga and painting. The children all participated well perfecting their Yoga poses: so much so, they have requested for us to repeat the session next half term! We have encouraged the children to practise their poses in preparation - we hope to see them practising on our Seesaw platform.

We have also had fun developing our sportsmanship with an Archery tournament followed by our First News quiz. We have celebrated Valentines day by baking biscuits and making cards for our loved ones.

Another fantastic half-term with our Nurture team - well done!








Gymnastics Champions

Pupil Leadership Team


